Dear Sir

Your letter of May 21st would have been answered earlier but for the fact that it only reached me a few days ago on my arrival in England from abroad. The delay was however so far fortunate inasmuch as it enabled me to see Mr. Woolley and to ascertain that his views on the matter entirely coincide with my own.

We are both agreed that, so far as he and I are concerned, you have our full permission and approval in publishing any

or all of the material found by us at Anibeh
when working for the Eckley Cox Junior Expedⁿ.

You are aware however that not only the
specimens, but also all notes drawings and
photographs are the property of the University
Museum of Philadelphia, and can only be
used with the consent and approval of the
Director, Dr. Gordon, to whom - as I see from your
letter - you have already applied with satisfactory
results.

I have only to add that if any difficulties
or ambiguities arise in the interpretation of
our notes Mr. Woolley and I will be happy to
do our best to make them clear.

I think

however that you will find the notes full and intelligible. Our investigations were made in two distinct years; in the first year I myself examined the brick pyramids and brought away whatever was lying on the surface or under the debris of fallen bricks, but opened none of the pits. In the second year Mr. Woolley, working by himself while I was on another site, opened a number of pits, including some which belonged to the brick pyramids.

It will be a great satisfaction to me that this material should be published, and I know that it could not be placed in the hands of anyone more completely qualified to treat it than yourself.
